A spirited and friendly Kingstonian beat the Gents on a rather fretful day for the hosts, who competed for long periods but lacked consistency in batting. Indefatigable captain Basker, deputising for Kumar, assimilated three debutants, one of whom, the jovial Kushal Sampath, top-scored despite having only deplaned from the Air India three hours before the match. He did not know he was playing until Basker picked him up. Sanjay Patel took his 400th Gents wicket thanks to Dhanu Gola's third catch.

Family commitments, technically defined as going to Edgbaston to watch the South Asian derby, took away seven regulars. Basker, a force of nature, stepped up with the Gola brothers, Bharat and Dhanu, Sampath and Ramkrishna Mangineni, the friend of Ravi Inkollu who last played in 2012 and who introduced Raja Pentakota. The GWLCC family tree sometimes resembles a bramble.

They were stuck in traffic so Sanjay Patel decided to bowl. The Gents then had their best period of the match as the seamers found their line immediately. Bharat Gola bowled Ali with one that kept low before Mangineni struck three times, Kings 33 for four in the 15th over. Their middle order batted assertively against the spinners, who got little help from the wicket. Niazi and Islam added 57 in 11 overs before holing out to long-on off Hemin Patel whereupon captain Wasim shepherded the tail to 160 all out. Several catches were dropped, none expensive, but the groundfielding held up well. Sanjay Patel's personal milestone came when Ali clipped to short cover and Bharat Gola took the first four wicket return of 2017, three coming in his second spell.

Seven Kings players were fasting but this did not affect their bowling and fielding one jot. After two wides, Caveney was bowled for a golden duck, one of four in the innings. Basker looked good before losing his timbers the ball before Dhanu Gola suffered the same fate. The Gents were up with the required run rate for 17 overs, Sampath striking five boundaries. The spinners Shabbir and Erun then shared four wickets as the last seven wickets fell for a miserly 32 runs, despite a strong looking middle-order and tail. Hemin Patel was unfortunately run out after being sent back by Ahmed, who batted well himself before holing out to long-on to give Kings a merited win. To bat for only 30.3 overs, even against an attack of high quality, was below expectations.

The assimilation of guests is a tricky process and Basker did well to involve everyone. The Gents are in flux. Twenty-five players have worn the shirt this season and there were seven changes here from the Northfields game. The Champions Trophy will be over soon and nobody could begrudge the Gents watching their Indian and Pakistani heroes in the flesh. Of greater importance is the East London Sunday T20 league. This has taken away several members and prospective members, and will do so until late July. If nothing else, this contradicts Matthew Engel who insisted recently in the Guardian that Sunday cricket is dying on its feet.

Saints shot Nascot out for 81 (Grimes 4-0-7-5) and surged to victory by 7 wickets, 85 for 3. There are countless slow bowlers on the circuit but few genuine spinners and fewer still offies. There is no stopping Saints this year. On the baking hot day of 25 June in Newbury they beat Hermits by one wicket, Hermits 181-8 (Rogers 4-12, Thomas 2-8), London Saints 184-9 (Berkeley 42*, Grant 23, Jones 17, Pearce 15*). At 116 for 9 the game seemed gone, but Peter Berkeley and Paul Pearce added an unbeaten club record 68 for the tenth wicket to win with two balls to spare. What a performance. Wonky Gents batting saw them dismissed for 91 on a slow but true pitch. Hurricanes then did what the Gents did not, applying themselves and knocking off the runs by ten past five with seven wickets and nearly 19 overs in hand.

This was a chastening day for a side which should have done much better. Although Perivale Park was a new venue for most Gents, the Telugu T20 boys know it well. Ealing Council has spent wisely on a new pavilion and it had a clean feel, unusual for a public park. It was a shame that the Gents could not do justice to the pleasant surroundings.

All credit to the hosts though. They have no demon quickies or fizzing spinners, and no powerhouse batsmen, but they concentrate on getting the basics right and the rewards were there for all to see. The Gents were inserted on a breezy afternoon and lost guest Petela caught first slip off a spiralling mistimed pull. Kumar got his head down before playing on but Krishna edged his second ball to second slip, Raj again obliging off Vikas. Bocha hit the first fours of the innings before chipping a caught and bowled to give the off-spinner Achal the first wicket of his quintet. Dubey likes to start assertively but was too early onto his first ball, lobbing to cover, Gents 29 for 5.

Meanwhile Hemin Patel was batting bravely and he finally found support in the trusted shape of Sanjay Patel, who put on 34 with him. Kaushik behind the timbers did the needful when Achal deceived Sanjay in the flight and Bandla was bowled four balls later. The tail was resolute enough but the demise of Hemin to the returning Prashant for a gallant and technically able 43 (four fours) put a three-figure score beyond reach. Four ducks, the same as the previous week, made dismal reading.

Dubey bowled six wides in his first over which rather summed up the visitors' day. Joel Snelling bowled Pankaj to whoops of delight and captain Kumar bowled very well, castling Raj and Kaushik. The Gents might have had a sniff had Sunit's booming vertical skyer not fallen unmolested to earth when he was on 9, when those in the vicinity opted to do a dance near the ball rather than try to catch it. It was that kind of day. Bowlers came and went and the effort was put in, but it was too small a total to defend.

Spare a thought for the captain. He had another debutant to fit in and another much changed team. The batting is challenged at the moment, as all out totals this season of 53, 101 and 91 attest, but the potential is there. Thanks to the Snellings and Elender Petela for guesting so cheerfully on a tough day.

The rain threatened by the BBC kept away. The junior game, of quite a high standard despite some idiotic field placings to the leg-spinner, overran (without apology from the modern parents) and the captains agreed a 35 overs format. The Gents won a good toss, batted steadily and won convincingly after taking an early flurry of visitors' wickets. This was a welcome return to form which ties the season at 4-4. Late changes saw the debut of Ranjith Chatharaju's friend Dino Francis (the 32nd. player of 2017) and the return of Sampath and the captain's cheerful friends Nanda and Sharma. The rate of change in the clubs was illustrated by the absence of 17 of those who contested this fixture in 2016. Of the Gents, only Bocha, Kumar and Hemin Patel played both. A monograph could be written on 2017 availability but through sustained, if sometimes eleventh-hour effort by members full teams are being fielded.

Caveney, who is finding opening a tough gig, and Sampath fell early but sensible batting from the middle order saw the overs batted through for only the second time in 2017. Fifties remain elusive (only Sachin Desai's so far, and that in the first game) but Bocha, Kumar, Dubey and Bandla all got in and while never running riot ensured that a workable total was got. Bandla was impressive in that he came in with only five overs to go and played forcibly but correctly from the off. There was a focus to the Gents' play, exemplified by Hemin Patel's workmanlike 39 in 22.3 overs (5 fours) that had been lacking in the previous two games, although too many easy singles are still being declined. The visitors generally bowled well, Bowman, Singh and spinner Seth the pick.

Kumar took the gloves and Dubey and Bocha shared the new ball, delivering spells of pace and accuracy. The innings began to unravel in the fourth over and by the seventh was in disarray as four wickets fell in 21 balls. Bocha had the top three, caught at short mid-off, mid-on and point. Dubey and Sanjay Patel, with a controversial lbw (see Note), then reduced St. Anne's to 27 for 5 in the 14th.

Thereafter they defended, ex-Weasel Regnier-Wilson batting 17 overs and 59 minutes for his 7. Hemin Patel and Bandla bowled spells of attrition, conceding only 7 runs in 8.1 overs and taking three wickets. The slow left-armer took wickets with his tenth and eleventh balls (the latter a catch by second 'keeper Dubey) and ran out Helas off his twelfth after fielding Bocha's throw. Sharma bowled accurately and took his first wicket for the club. After a certain amount of levity by both sides Hemin Patel then wrapped things up at five past six when he bowled Stephenson. Kumar had used ten bowlers. How briefly cannot be foreseen, but after his runs and another wicket Hemin Patel tops both runs and wickets totals after this match. He was not slow in broadcasting this fact.

Mickey Mouse paid a most welcome visit in White Swans' innings. Gents had 12, including the skipper's mate Ashish Lele who would bowl but not bat. Kumar also loaned Lele's mate Umkar to White Swans as they were one short. Twelve Gents then infiltrated the pitch and the Gents had bowled 6.4 overs before their scorer noticed, just after Guhan had been given out lbw to Dubey. After much animated but amiable discussion the umpire called a dot ball. Law 41, a dignified piece of prose, is understandably silent on such buffoonery. The umpire should have done a headcount before the innings started although no harm was done. To those who say that the innings should have restarted we say this. Once the bowler begins his run up previous decisions cannot be changed. And people have homes to go to.

Dubey swung the ball away up the hill and was parsimonious (he's going at under 3 runs per over this season) but on the day was outshone by the very impressive Ranjith Chatharaju. His figures speak for themselves and from 16 for 2 off 11 overs there was no way back for the visitors. Lele's left-arm round troubled the batsmen and Bocha took a sharp low caught and bowled. Batsmen came and went cheerfully, two in three balls from Hemin Patel, who along with Bandla was withdrawn after a singleton to give everyone a go. Wickets were shared around, Sampath and Caveney taking their first for the club and Dubey got a stumping. Caveney finished off proceedings when he had Amrish taken sharply by square-leg Sampath, celebrating with a dance the contents of which need not detain us.

Is a pleasure to report that the fixture was retained for 2018. It will be interesting to see White Swans' evolution. After nearly folding in the winter they have expelled their glory hunters and got in a lot of new, young players. Good luck to them, they were excellent company.
