Decade was written in the afterglow of five years' unbroken success, which boasted 64 wins in 97 games, with the Bob Ashton Memorial Cup won every year. This was bound to incur a reaction; the Gents had become the team to beat. In the damp summer of 1998 opponents improved, the Gents suffered with injuries and some players moved away or lost interest. From a strategic point of view the club also made mistakes. The base of opponents remained too small, little effort was made to find an improved home ground and succession planning was non-existent. For years, the charismatic Ashton had led the club but well though Dhruv Patel did in his prolonged absence from May there was little attempt to groom a long-term successor. This was the year Sanjay Patel came of age. He had a superb season but in a watershed year results saw a profound downturn in a rainy summer in which only 15 games were completed. The main absences were Wright (travelling in New Zealand), Ashton (injured in the first West XI game), while the gentle Lancastrian Maughan opted for the golf course, having played only one game in 1997.

Five of the seven wins came against irregular opposition but the campaign was not wholly unenjoyable, firstly because expectations were not too high and secondly because of the cheerful leadership of D. Patel, who after Ashton's injury kept the ship afloat. It was the year when everybody got a go and, unlike the Ashton era, nobody got glared at or muttered at. If it worked, fine, if not, there was always next week: 'You had better bat first,' he said to 12 Angry Men, 'otherwise it will be all over by three-thirty.' Sad but true.

The statistics of the season were neither compelling nor misleading: Snelling's took 24 fewer wickets and D. Patel's 11; the average score was the lowest since 1992; and the number of wins, down from 12 in 1997 to seven, was the lowest since 1991. S. Patel, however, scored 397 runs, up from 250. It was clear that he was a gifted all-rounder but was perhaps not at this point seen as a potential captain.

West XI deservedly regained the Bob Ashton Memorial Cup with after a fine display by new signing, the confident Australian Cameron Vine, who ripped through the late order and then hit a pulsating 84*. Thereafter the season meandered on in a pleasant enough way, with predictable results, though the Gents blocked a tense draw against, for whom Ian Groves-Loader had scored a fluent hundred before holing out to that splendid fielder Mark Burville. A young student made his debut against FC Chad on 16 August. His name? Hemin Patel.

An enjoyable President's Cup, in this era a well planned and executed competition, was won by Weasels after Dhruv Patel horrifically ran himself out first ball in the final. The season ended with past players taking on the new wave in a 30-over tenth anniversary fixture. The day was marred by a facial injury to Dhruv, knocked on the conk by a Dolan beamer when on 49 and carted off to Kingston hospital. He deserved better than that after keeping things going so well all year. This game saw the farewells of stalwarts Simon Alderman, Des Dolan and Richard Sambrook Smith, while John Townley would play only once more.

Ashton's last full season was the first losing one since 1990, but an improvement on the damp, frustrating 1998 campaign, though the 13 Gent run out victims may have disagreed. It was a curious season, at times, as in the President's Cup, undisciplined and fractious, at others, e.g. against West XI, highly competent. Nor did the weather follow a consistent pattern. The sun shone much of the time but there were spectacular floods at Eltham and Surbiton. FC Chad gained their only win against the Gents, but the Bob Ashton Memorial Cup was regained 3-0. Stuart Snelling took 21-3-38-11 in the rubber and on 16 May returned 17-6-33-8 against 12 Angry Men on his way to a season's aggregate of 149.5-25-417-43, records for both number of overs and wickets.

It was the year the tail wagged, innings recovering from 88-4 to 211 (FC Chad), 63-7 to 124 (12 Angry Men), 84-5 to 166 (West XI) and 90-5 to 188-9 (Sunderland SC). Full sides were fielded in all but three games and in two of those a Gent was loaned to the opposition to even up the numbers. There were plenty of comedy moments, with Mr Ashton usually to the fore. Pre-match briefings on his journeys to the games from Hitchin, in which everyone and everything was blamed except his poor sense of direction, became much looked forward to. His wicket-keeping, especially those leg-side takes with a combination of pad, glove and arm, had several players in stitches. Yet as he rightly countered, he was the first catcher into double figures in five years. Snelling turned up for a game in tight Lycra cycling shorts and Fryer-Kelsey dyed his hair blond. It was that sort of summer.

The campaign comprised a healthy middle period of just three defeats in 13 games, but with only one win out of nine either side of it. It was generally a bowler's season while the catching statistics recorded not only Ashton's impressive tally behind the timbers but a splendid eight for Fielder of the Year Richmond. His apart, only 20 other outfield catches were taken, a poor show. The President's Cup was a gruesome day for the club, but a notable one for FC Chad and the ultimate winners, New Barbarian Weasels. The season ended with an abandonment against Church Street Nomads due to a thunderstorm before the third win against West XI, who suffered in 1999 from both the absence of their 1998 hero Vine and limp leadership. This season was the end of an era. Ken Toft played the first of his 137 games in the July classic at Town Park against Sunderland SC.

After dismal early season weather caused two cancellations, the Gents enjoyed an unbeaten May to christen their most successful season to date, the first under the captaincy of Snelling, who had taken over from Ashton in the winter. Wright dominated the batting with a record 756 runs including three centuries and four fifties. Mark Sciberras, who would play 175 times, Damian Evans and Eddie Fitch joined which gave the Gents a more youthful look. Ashton missed the season and would only play a handful more games. Only Enterprise, London Saints and, in a dead rubber, West XI got the better of an improved, more balanced team. The season's first defeat came in an excellent game against Enterprise, sexagenarian Bill Dimond and son Keith producing sterling performances, who were one of only six sides to bowl the Gents out.

The Enterprise return was S. Patel's captaincy debut. He put on 137 with Harper-Dallas in a game in which five penalty runs were conceded when the ball hit a McDonald's bag containing the tea of one Nicholas Boddington, which the bespectacled southpaw had carried to his fielding position. 'Ever the innovators and groundbreakers, the Gentlemen of West London CC raised the virtuosity of cricket teas to a new level,' observed Bignell.

Ian Richmond organised the first tour, to the West Midlands. A run-filled Saturday game on an artificial school wicket included a Fitch five-for and a D. Patel hat-trick, which guest Andy Robinson harshly debriefed as 'a dodgy stumping decision, a poor boy so frightened he trod on his stumps and the easiest catch I've ever seen.' At Enville CC a day later, the ex-Birmingham League openers retired according to the rules of the game. Rain ended proceedings early to the relief of the tourists, who then tucked into a generous tea. 'A reality check' observed Sciberras. It was despite the rain the best of the club's tours to this beautiful part of England, not least because of the efforts of Buck, who, lacking only mauve jacket and polyester tie, ferried everyone about in a minibus as though a coach driver born and bred.

With the Bob Ashton Cup retained 2-1, and victory in the President's Cup, it was a remarkably good season. Wright scored his third century in the club's record chase, against 12 Angry Men for whom Denton scored 57. Only Husain (680 in 2007) and Kota (674 in 2019) have since come near this total.

Despite a healthy number of wins, the fleeting return of Ashton and some solid individual performances, including four batsmen with 300 or more runs, this was a difficult season. Captain Snelling was not given the unconditional support that should have been his as of right, there was friction within the club and three of the defeats were by embarrassing margins. The friendliness of the Gents, something the eloquent and perceptive Sciberras felt was 'instinctive and imperative' to preserve, was gradually being eroded. Towards the end of the season there was a regression to the bickering of 1999 with graceless behaviour both in victory and defeat. Things had to change.

Furthermore, though there was mid-season talk of a merger between the Gents and West XI and a brief sarcasm amnesty, relations between the clubs fell to a new low. Snelling was outmanoeuvred tactically by Wright in the Bob Ashton Memorial Cup but received little support from some of his senior players in the two defeats, though the President's Cup was solidly retained. New Barbarian Weasels were having problems in 2001 and the captain was glad to write them a letter of encouragement before an EGM at which their very future was discussed. The circuit was pleased that they continued and they still play.

Damon Wilson was the only man to hit a century against both West XI (in 2002) and the Gents. Having suffered some agonising defeats to their old rivals since 1999, Wilson, supported by fifties from Bullock and Anderson, helped 12 Angry Men to post the highest score by opponents till 2023, 284-3. A reply of 164 had a certain dignity which the 62 all out (minus Snelling) against Exiles a week later (a ton here for Atkins) certainly did not.

Buck scored his only century against the Weasels, though soon after reaching this milestone he walked into a high full-pitch and ended his day in Kingston hospital. Remarkably, he has no other fifties to his name. Snelling took five wickets in five balls against London Canaries and the Gents said goodbye to Daniel Todd who took 148 wickets in his 147 games and remains seventh in the all-time list. Peter Denton, whose demeanour and sportsmanship were in diametrical opposition to some of the chancers infesting the club in this era, made the first of his 129 appearances.

Had West XI been beaten the previous September, then 2001 might have been regarded as a successful year. The natural West London order was, however, restored in 2002 in a splendid game – Ashton's last – at Berkhamsted and the Gents would feel better about themselves. The pendulum would swing to West XI in 2003 with the signing of Vyas and Bhatt. Though Mark Hancock would disappear over the winter, three very important signings were made. Stuart Snelling brought along Richard Gilkes, Jason Irvin brought along James Lewis and Colin Naish referred an Australian colleague, Steve Jones, who had become disillusioned with league cricket but fancied a few games for a friendly team. Each in his own way would contribute well. The last was seen of Nick Boddington after 82 games in which he scored 1,416 runs and took 98 wickets with his slow left-arm spin.

The club generally behaved better in 2002, though Irvin and Thompson came close to fists in the tense tie against London Rams, Irvin storming off the pitch. The cricket was patchy until mid-July as the Gents suffered four defeats in the inaugural PALs League, won by Urban Associates. To ensure umpiring consistency, all balls down the leg side in the PALs League were, for this season only, to be called wide. This gave rise to some large extras totals, e.g. in the first West XI match Gents conceded 44 (the day's top score), including 26 wides. It is interesting to record how enthusiastically West XI took on their league commitments, judging it on their website to be a 'great success' but then after a pause for reflection resigned from it after their AGM.

Jones made a quiet debut in June against Weasels, but after the second defeat to Urbans (Buck 43) matters began to improve, culminating in an extraordinary inning at Gunnersbury Park, the club's highest. The great West XI rivals rubbed along better in 2002, so much so that the amalgam 27 July game against London Rams is regarded in both clubs' annals as a win. West XI support was also needed against 12 Angry Men, Hill taking 3-18 and scoring 15* in support of S. Patel's ice-cool 38* in a then-record tenth-wicket stand of 51 as Gents won by one wicket. This game will forever be remembered for its sensational catching, Jones pouching the dangerous Conroy one-handed high above his head on the Balaclava Road boundary as the ball looked certain to be a six, then falling himself to a wonderful slip catch by Hibbert.

It had been a solid rather than spectacular year in terms of individual performances (the Jonestown Massacre at Gunnersbury Park aside) but a definite improvement on 2001. Matters were, however, about to take a turn for the worse.

The Berkhamsted defeat in the 0-3 concession of the Bob Ashton Memorial Cup was the twelfth of the season, a tally only equalled in 2005, while six wins was the fewest since 1990 when only nine games were played. A strong case could therefore be made for 2003 being the worst Gents' season. It was a torrid baptism on and off the field for new captain S. Patel, elected in controversial circumstances at the AGM when a cabal led by Buck, D. Patel, Hill and Wright ousted the successful Snelling. Fitch, a skilful player who never quite fulfilled his potential with GWLCC, refused to play under Patel and soon left while Ashton had retired. But Patel impressed by sorting out the disciplinary problems in the club as well as keeping his own game at a high pitch. Nobody could say he shirked tough decisions. It was a difficult season for all, but especially the new players in that it would have been preferable to have introduced them gradually into a winning team. Instead, they were thrown into the deep end. Perhaps it was to be the making of Nabeel Husain.

One cannot, however, be too critical of a side who had to make do without Ashton, Boddington, Jones, Minhas, Murphy and Wright from previous seasons. Young sides are by their nature inconsistent. Helped by some big wins batting first and three fifties from West XI guest Vyas, the 2003 Gents outscored their opponents (2,588 runs to 2,582) and scored more fifties (seven to six) but only five times did they bat the full 35 overs, winning three of those games, tying one and losing one narrowly to a powerful Weasels. The batting was therefore clearly a problem for most of the season. The nadir was the collapse to an admittedly strong Feathers attack, Hill penning an acidulous match report. Patel struggled to improve things with the resources he had, though to his great credit he never bemoaned this fact and was apt to be sharp when reminded how strong the batting had often been in recent seasons. There was more to praise in the bowling. For the first time since 1997, no opposition reached 200, though cynics argued that they didn't have to when Gents batted first. S. Patel took most wickets.

The biggest problems were the lack of continuity and the absence of Wright, who had moved to New Zealand in what would transpire to be one of Empire's shorter emigrations. The Gents fielded 48 players in 2003, which spoke eloquently of the contacts the club had, but during the unparalleled run of success between 1993 and 1997 the maximum used was 33 and the minimum (in 1997) just 26, which did not seem to be a non-causal relationship. A vibrant, talented 12 Angry Men won the second PALs League, but Urbans, the 2002 winners, would not contest the trophy again. West XI had withdrawn after only one year.

In 2003 *The Gent* had noted that if the club wanted to field members-only line-ups then the membership was too small to sustain the current level of fixtures. An influx of new players meant that it was easier to raise teams and full sides were fielded each game. It was gratifying that in the June Weasels/Old Rutlishians double-header weekend, nine players played both matches. Along with the tour, the highlight of the season was winning the PALs League with four victories batting second, though in both return legs the opposition were below strength, The Gents lending Weasels and 12 Angry Men players to make up the numbers. Successes were shared about (12 players made 100 runs) but Batsman and All-rounder of the Year Wayne Thompson had a fine season. The totals of players used, 32, was down exactly a third on 2003. This gave the captain greater continuity, which undoubtedly helped results, though the batting order was seldom settled, due to a combination of form, tactics and happenstance. Bill Flack's eight wickets in his first two games and all-round presence gave the club great hope for the future on and off the pitch but sadly he would retire through ill-health the following season.

The Gents completed two games on tour for the only time and won them both with identical scores of 163. The maiden victory over Bedouins was the best performance of the summer. Many of the games were low-scoring, but there were runfests against London Rams and Enterprise. Three remarkably similar Gents' scores of 151-8, 150-8 and 151-7 were not enough in the Bob Ashton Cup and West XI, who won 17 and lost only 6 games this season, triumphed 3-0.

This was the year the Gents fell out of love with Victoria RG, Surbiton. The wickets had become variable and sometimes dangerous. Embarrassingly, no pitch was prepared for the game with Urbans. The captain described the wickets at the AGM as 'diabolical'. New vice-captain Sciberras agreed with him and recommended playing three games away from VRG to test the water, with a full review to be held in a year's time.

The Gents had led in the matter of sponsorship from 2001 when a £500 per annum deal was brokered by Max Minhas with Chivers Easton Brown, a firm of Surrey solicitors. At a time when relations between the clubs were poor, West XI reacted with sarcastic disdain to this initiative, but in hindsight the sponsorship, as predicted by Buck, proved more trouble than it was worth. CEB did not renew in 2004, Minhas left, no new sponsor could be found and the Gents were left with a pile of out-of-date sponsored shirts. This was a somewhat casual approach to branding.

Not even the most ardent Gent fan could call 2005 a campaign of unremitting glory, but it did have its successes. The PALs League was retained on a shared basis after two compelling early performances and West XI were taken to a decider in the Bob Ashton Memorial Cup for the first time since 2002. S. Patel's scored his only hundred, which came just 22 days after Husain's, one of an unprecedented six scores of fifty or more in just 13 games for the young Saudi, who dominated the scoring with 586 runs. Otherwise, the batting was patchy, with only Patel (303) and Denton (207) over 200, though the latter (who along with Turpin kept wicket manfully and skilfully) and guest Bhatt recorded their maiden fifties, the former after a recount due to botched scoring (Husain's hundred was similarly upgraded after proper audit). A notable career milestone was S. Patel's achievement of 3,000 runs and 200 wickets, his 200th. wicket being Enterprise's redoubtable Keith Dimond.

The absence of a strike bowler for all but two games was felt, though Husain, S. Patel, Sciberras (top of the wickets list with 18) and Wright were economical and sometimes penetrative. Snelling took the Gents' only four-wicket haul (D. Patel's eccentric 4-57 came when on loan to Sunderland SC). Buck, Butt, D. Patel, H. Patel and K. Patel were less consistent, going for five or more per over, though each had at least one excellent spell. Buck and H. Patel (seven each) took most catches in a year of outcricket that was patchy but, as at Gunnersbury Park, occasionally inspired.

In the high summer, the Gents were pretty good, but the only early season success came in the 1-run nail-biter against a superb new opposition in Pak, impressively achieved without the captain or Snelling. An unbeaten club record Husain/S. Patel fourth-wicket stand of 127 against Weasels at King's College kick-started an impressive run of scores, the only blips being the Weasels return and West XI away, the latter game actually won, by tight bowling (led by Snelling on a brief return from Brazil) and fielding. However, Gents were unable to defend 187 in the second Pak game and 184 at Brondesbury against excellent batting sides. Several players thought the latter clash (agonisingly lost off the fifth ball of the last over) the best of the year. Those there will long remember Casuals' captain Bernie Spratt summoning his players back from the showers as the Gents fought back to take a clutch of late wickets.

But to offset these spectaculars, there were dismal collapses against the ever-sociable London Saints (twice), Jay Bharat, Weasels, Salix and statistically at least, the worst of the lot, 60 all out at home to West XI, the club's lowest in this series. It was common in the post-mortems to plead for more settled batting orders, but that was easier said than done when several top batters were only able to play half the games. Wayne Thompson, who left after the first game, was missed. Later, he appeared for London Rams and belted 146 against West XI.

The year began awfully with the death at 49 of Ian 'Marty' Renvoize, a keen player and loyal friend from the formative years of the club. Five founder players attended his January funeral in Bury St. Edmunds. The winter nets were enlivened by the presence of some new players heralding what the club hoped would be a new era. In the event, the playing season was in danger of fizzling out in August, but ended as it began with a starburst of wins and was therefore judged ultimately successful, with 13 games won and only eight lost, of which seven came in nine outings mid-season. Nabeel Husain and Village XI's Roland Heyman scored hundreds. Though it had its frustrations, 2006 was a pleasant season of promising new players, high scores and silverware, though the Gents had to make do with a 1-1 in the Bob Ashton Memorial Cup, each side gaining a convincing away win after the first game had been cancelled due to rain.

Disappointing aspects were the resignation of Justin Norcott, poor timekeeping at the more northerly games and the lack of support for the prestigious Bedouins match, played on one of the most beautiful and historic grounds in England, which ended a period in which mass absences drove the club's organisers frantic. This nine-game slump from 17 June to 6 August saw hot weather, resignations, illness, holidays and strong opposition conjoin to deadly effect. Since Black Sunday in May 1992, Gents' fans had clung to the hammering inflicted that day by West XI as consolation that things could be worse, but those who made the journey to Hampton to watch or play in the Village XI game now had a new badge of honour.

The rota was 47. There were six guests against Jay Bharat and three, none of whom stand-in captain Gilkes had met before, against Brondesbury Casuals. Husain significantly missed all seven defeats in the dog days, while Wright, Snelling and D. Patel made only nine combined appearances in that period. Husain dominated the batting with four fifties on top of his hundred. Wright (twice), Sciberras, S. Patel and Gilkes scored the other Gent fifties. Husain also jointly headed the bowling on 20 wickets with H. Patel, though more parsimoniously, typical of what was more of a seamer's year. His low economy rate (3.4), so vital in limited over games was only bettered by Snelling (whose bag of wickets did not reflect his excellent, sometimes fearsome spells) and nearly matched by Babar, S. Patel and Wright. The slow men, Buck (18 wickets), H. Patel (20), D. Patel (12) and K. Patel (7) had some good spells but still averaged four or five per over, copping flak against the likes of Village XI and Brondesbury when the strike bowlers were absent.

A season of promising early cricket ended the first 20 years glumly with four losses in the final five games. It was a similar season to 2006, but one left that left many questions unanswered. A more accurate perspective might have been possible had six of the first 14 games not been ruined by rain. Five matches were cancelled (though Old Tenisonians, itself a last minute fixture after Brondesbury Casuals pulled out because of other commitments, was rearranged) and the pivotal West XI home leg abandoned after a freak storm.

Husain, eloquently described by Snelling at a lively AGM as the most talented player in the club's history, scored 680 runs, including two hundreds, three fifties and a 49*, took 17 wickets and held 12 catches. The charge that the Gents were too reliant on him had some substance (indeed S. Patel reckoned 2007 to have been the worst batting season for some years, with Husain merely papering over the cracks), but what a performance his was, and in his final full season too.

S. Patel and Denton were consistent, but nobody else made 200 runs, though D. Patel batted fluently against West XI at Gunnersbury Park and Old Tenisonians. Gilkes's fifty was a match-winner against a game Enterprise. Lloyd Wahed provided fireworks at Gunnersbury, along with three super catches, and so deserved a fifty against Salix. Rob Babar, who kindly introduced his brother Ed, and Carroll found their batting form against Salix and also bowled some tight spells. Alex Young showed promise. Poor Toft suffered again from injury and had a muted season, but kindly always gave his full support. Khan batted fluently against 12 Angry Men.

S. Patel and Buck took five-wicket hauls against London Saints and Weasels, but it was the subtle spin of H. Patel who, with beautiful flight, topped the bowling with 24 wickets, he and Husain restricting the batsmen to under 3.5 runs per over. Snelling was not helped by the damp, slow wickets but lost none of his guile after 1,373 overs for the club, remaining a top-class bowler. S. Patel, having said pre-season that he would not bowl much, often opened the bowling and was cunning and effective. Other bowling lacked penetration, while D. Patel was underused and after Berkhamsted sent a communication on the matter of an incendiary nature.

The PALs League was tied with Pak, as was the Bob Ashton Memorial Cup with a West XI side who improved throughout the season. The best performances were against West XI at Gunnersbury Park and London Saints at Old Tenisonians. Both Pak matches, Old Tenisonians, London Saints away and the combative Wombles were also highly enjoyable. The disappointment of the summer was the double-booking by Jay Bharat of their home game. After they walked away from the problem, Gubbays kindly stood in.
