The club entered 2008 with S. Patel, captain since 2003, leading a side in transition. Two stars dipped below the horizon when Wright moved to Wales and Husain returned to Saudi Arabia, having scored between them eight of the club's then 14 centuries. A varied card saw eight new opponents. Only Hale, Salix and St Anne's Allstars would remain on the card in 2020. New Barbarian Weasels, for years the club who set the standard on and off the pitch, were played for the last time. In June the club was celebrating with misplaced confidence a ten-match unbeaten run. Some wondered when they were going to be tested. Such back-slapping sides inevitably come a cropper and only four of the final twelve matches were won. Yet this period saw much exciting cricket, including ties with West London Invitational XI and Salix, two of only six in the club's history. The main problem was the batting, as pint-sized totals of 57, 62, 89 and 91 attested.

It was a year of often tense cricket with abundant close finishes. Perhaps the team learned more from those nail-biters than the big wins. The Gents were a whisker away from a winning 2-0 lead in the Bob Ashton Memorial Cup, needing seven runs from two overs with seven wickets down, but it was not to be as the visitors held their nerve. West XI's scorer had expressed surprise at the inclusion of four South Asian debutants in the first game, shaking his head and muttering that his own club 'had not gone down that road', this term being undefined which was perhaps for the best. West XI's strong side administered a drubbing in the decider on a day when the Gents did not help themselves with poor administration and late withdrawals.

Newcomer Ravi Inkollu made an instant impression. He scored 459 runs and introduced Murali Kalidindi, and Suman Rudru, who would later pursue a career in the Telugu film industry. Chris Beaumont, who played 16 times in the early days, was also a film star but in a *genre* that catered for the adult market. Hale saw Rudru's first appearance. Lent to the opposition in civilian clothing, he promptly lofted H. Patel for two enormous sixes into the trees, an interlude that entered club annals within seconds. Ahsan Iqbal, having found the club on the internet, also debuted and with a model action generated fearsome pace off a short run. He was with Stuart Snelling the fastest bowler to play for the club. More runs needed to be scored but the bowling attacks looked promising. There was talent and spirit in the squad with Khan, who joined in 2007, Denton and Gilkes batting consistently and H. Patel and Snelling sharing 62 wickets. It was therefore possible to be hopeful about the future, but few would have predicted the events of the following year.

This dry summer was the Gents' best with 21 games won and only two lost. It was a fitting season to end S. Patel's first captaincy stint of seven years, his own game being at the highest pitch. He averaged 54 with the bat and paid only 3.4 runs an over with the ball. Some victories were close but when under pressure the Gents always found men to rise to the occasion. The top five batsmen all posted personal best aggregates. There were seven century partnerships, 19 fifties scored by nine players, then-record stands for the eighth and tenth wickets and five bowlers who took 20 wickets. The Bob Ashton Memorial Cup was won for the first time since 2002 with a 3-0 scoreline and there was a successful tour to Hampshire. Every player produced at least one match-winning display and the 216 wickets taken and 83 catches held have never been beaten. Four all-rounders (Inkollu, Iqbal, S. Patel and Rudru) scored 200 runs and took 20 wickets, a unique achievement. Only Crown Taverners in a T20 and a strong Salix inspired by the brilliant Tasmanian Nick Goold beat the Gents.

Patel perceptively observed that the spirit which defined the 2009 season was forged in the 2008 Salix tie, a week after West XI had bowled out the Gents for 57 in the Gothic mists of New Beckenham. The key was teamwork or as Steve Bignell put it: "The confidence of continued success welded the Gents into a tough, rounded side almost impossible to down."

The Gents took full advantage of the variable RB Kingston home pitches, whose every caprice they knew, winning all seven games there. Victoria RG was seen for the last time – three more wins – as the Gents slowly bade farewell to LB Kingston.

Less was seen of Buck, Denton and Snelling, but in came plenty of new players as the side changed before one's very eyes. Lalam, who suffered at injury at work and would not play again, Palmer and Rudru joined as members. Caveney, Dubey, Kumar and Newcombe all debuted and would become strong future contributors. The Desais, with Sachin back from Hong Kong, played their first full seasons. H. Patel played every game while Toft missed only two. Fifteen played 10 or more games which gave the captain stability and continuity. Such commitment from a small squad would seem barely credible by the end of 2017.

This was the season the Gents had to circle the wagons. Opponents bruised in 2009 regrouped, while some talented players disappeared. It was therefore to the credit of S. Patel, who bequeathed a happy club, incoming captain Gilkes and vice-captain H. Patel that despite, with one exception, unprepossessing individual performances it was a winning season. The Bob Ashton Memorial Cup was retained with two narrow wins, the second a classic, inspired by a captaincy masterclass from Gilkes. It was an intriguing campaign, with much good cricket. Khan and Newcombe were active in sourcing players, including Mark Jones, who joined as a bowler, sadly struggled with his action yet was always worth his place for inspirational support. Guest contributions were appreciated from late August as holidays, injuries and Ramadan took their usual toll.

Gilkes's runs, H. Patel's wickets (only two shy of Snelling's 1999 record) and S. Desai's fielding dismissals were personal bests, and S. Patel again scored over 300 runs. Gents' attacks went for a record 3,558 runs. Poundings by Old Tenisonians, Northfields, Brentham and Village and more Twenty20 games disfigured the economy rates. Of the 2009 heroes Inkollu had returned to India, Lalam was injured and Iqbal and Rudru were seen less after joining Saturday league teams. Replacements stepped up. Dubey, Kumar and Newcombe and the talismanic Hibbert were regularly available from July. Admirable commitment by club stalwarts ensured a measure of consistency in selection. Ten were fielded in four games and nine in one, other complements being full.

There were two new opponents in 2007, eight in 2008, five in 2009 and four in 2010. Some odd sides tumbled off the list including the entitled British Library, whose website was bang up to date until they met the Gents and upset Treasurer Toft by refusing to pay all their tea money. Their match report is still awaited. The Gents batted 46 overs against Brentham, the most faced in ten years, and copped a wiggling from the umpire for applauding batsmen to the crease. The season ended with a pounding by Village, a narrow defeat to Salix and a close win in a cracker against Hale.

The first losing season since 2005 saw spectacular batsmanship on often damp pitches and a stylish retention of the Bob Ashton Memorial Cup in its final season. The 2010 squad played between them 80 fewer games so replacements had to be found. Two new hard-hitting batsmen were of great influence. South African Gregg Cloete, known from Enterprise, scored 180 of his 221 runs in boundaries and Ramanjit Lall figured in record stands of 162 and 127 with Himanshu Desai. Cloete and Lall put on 161 in just 11.1 overs in the second West XI game at Crown Taverners, Lall's 102 only the second in the series. However, only two of the first 11 matches were won.

Toft was unable to tour Malta because of illness. Gilkes travelled though barely fit while Sachin Desai got injured there. Kumar, having started the domestic season with two fifties, never recovered from a knee injury sustained in May. Within a few weeks members had to drag in guests, S. Patel introducing Lall to some effect. It is not controversial to say that Lall's season improved after innings of 8, 7 and a golden duck against West XI. By the end of the season Denton's promising Sainsbury's colleagues Devunuri and Raghothamreddy were regulars, though they would return to India in 2012.

The side batted poorly chasing, the exceptions being the first West XI game and the truncated tussle with Village which left a trail of diplomatic incidents in its wake resulting in cancellation of the fixture. Eight men scored fifties and Lall pummelled two centuries, the first since Husain's 108 against Weasels in 2008. Seven new sides were played. Jones returned to Cheltenham in June and Iqbal and Snelling played rarely, so the bowling lacked pace until Lall and Raghothamreddy joined, but the slow men stepped up. The penetrative Sciberras went for a miserly 3.7 per over in his best season with the ball. Economy was also provided by seamers Kumar, Lall, Newcombe and S. Patel at around four and latterly Raghothamreddy at three. The fielding was steady, 66 catches being four up on 2010's total in three fewer games. H. Desai was again the best 'keeper on the circuit.

The Gents had a fine 25th season, recovering from some limp early defeats to win 12 of the last 14 games. Only five were lost, half the number suffered in 2010 and 2011. The revolving door span dizzily, but a keen, improving team emerged who relished the opportunities they were given. Runs were scored at the fastest rate ever, six per over and conceded at only four. Newcombe took over as captain in June after H. Patel's resignation and led impressively while adding a notch or two to his own game.

The merger of West XI and Walthamstow Horizontals meant the cessation of the Bob Ashton Memorial Cup after 22 seasons. The first meeting against the Anschluss club Judd Street Tigers was rained off, a fate that would dog this fixture. Fears of a resultant lack of focus proved unfounded and the cricket played on tour in the Cotswolds and twice against Salix was some of the best in the decade.

It was a damp summer and only 18 games were played, the joint lowest since the club began to play weekly in 1993 and four fewer than in 2011. Individual run aggregates were therefore unremarkable. Bocha, S. Desai, Dubey and S. Patel had good all-round returns, but for the first time since 1990 no batsman scored 300. Gents' bowlers, seamers to a man, absorbed H. Patel's bag of wickets and restricted opponents to an average of 128 runs per innings, reversing the trend since 2009 of 132, 142 and 148.

The transformed Sachin Desai (taught by Hibbert at nets to bowl the outswinger) took most wickets while Bocha, Dubey, Hibbert, Kumar, S. Patel and Pentakota were miserly. The clouds were injuries, which reduced the appearances of Caveney, de la Perrelle, Denton, H. Desai and Toft, fewer appearances from stalwarts Gilkes, H. Patel, Khan, Sciberras and Snelling, the absence of Buck for the first time since 1995 and the cancellation of the 12 Angry Men game due to lack of players.

With H. Patel's withdrawal, the return to India of Devunuri, Inkollu and Raghothamreddy and reduced commitment, new players had to be taken on board quickly. Inkollu's legacy was three gifted players from his Saturday Twenty20 franchise, Mangineni, who soon moved to Lancashire, Bocha and Pentakota. Newcombe brought in the Wright brothers, two men only in their early twenties but with bags of league experience. Jones, completing the Cheltenham quartet, played more and proved his ability. The experience of the Desais, Dubey, Hibbert, Khan, Kumar, S. Patel and Toft complemented the younger players. S. Patel and Pentakota set a record stand for the tenth wicket against Salix.

The successful Jubilee season under Greg Newcombe and Horace Hibbert is now cherished, but it took some organizing. No fewer than 51 players donned the shirt, the most ever, of whom 13 played only in the 25th anniversary games and seven only on tour. Naveed Khan missed the season through illness and Himanshu Desai and de la Perrelle through injury. Desai, a fine contributor and de la Perrelle would not play again. George Wright went travelling and brother Laurie's blossoming musical career meant he was absent until August. Toft was rarely available apart from the Netherlands tour. It was therefore somewhat chaotic week to week and there was a danger that the tour would have to be cancelled before Judd Street Tigers mustered behind the flag and supplied five players. It was fitting that the best game of the season, tied 231 runs each (the last such result and only the sixth in the club's history), was between the fledging rivals. Tigers lost only twice all season. The Gents remained unbeaten in England, winning 13 of the last 14 games and tying the other, a run that would be extended by five in 2014, a club record. Ramanjit Lall swept the awards and hit a record 27 sixes.

When it became clear that absences were threatening the ability to fulfil fixtures (one was indeed lost) the committee reacted quickly. Caveney, Hibbert, Sciberras and Lall were of great assistance in arranging guests, several of whom proved of high talent. It was a pleasure to welcome three new regulars: Tom Jones, (introduced by Greg Newcombe), who only stayed one season, Jonny Small (introduced by Mark Jones) and latterly Vijay Basker (introduced by Praveen Bocha). Small scored 57* on debut and would prove with Basker a signing of importance.

The total of games looked nothing out of ordinary but was skewed by unplanned short second ones against Ramgarhia, MSV Zeemacht and London Saints. Seven Sundays were missed before September, none due to the weather. Rams (and their desperate replacements BBC Mishits), Swinging Googlies and Crown Taverners bailed on the Gents, while the Gents bailed on Northfields. Other weekends were left fallow.

An early Twenty20 win over Cairns Fudge was notable for sprung stumps at the batsmen's end, a kitbag masquerading as the stumps at the bowlers' and Cloete (16 balls) leapfrogging Bocha (21 balls), who had just 20 minutes before scored the fastest Gents' fifty. Lall's runs aggregate of 486 was the highest since Husain's 680 in 2007. As the season progressed H. Patel and S. Desai rediscovered their enthusiasm to great effect. Chairman Khan worked tirelessly to market the club, setting up a new website and a Facebook page as the Gents dipped their toes into the freezing waters of social media.

A century after the start of the Great War the Gents suffered as long a list of missing players as any public school, university or factory team from that benighted year. It was more than symbolic that Gilkes, Sciberras and Snelling were absent for the first time in many years, though they would return. Rapid change was afoot as the new signings put their own stamp on the team. In August 1914, boys just out of school left the cricket field to face the guns of the Imperial German Army. In 2014, the combatants were time's wingèd chariot hurrying near, injuries and work.

Yet full teams were fielded every week but one and nine scores of 200 were compiled in the 16 games played. Vijay Basker drew deeply from the well of talent in his Twenty20 franchise United Titans to complement the remaining regulars. He, Praveen Bocha and Raj Pentakota had extensive club service and were joined by a splendid new bowler, Aravind Katragadda, whose hop, skip and jump run up and unerring accuracy became one of the sights of the season. Karthik Jampala and Anil Oruganti also debuted and impressed. By season's end Titans had contributed more than a third of all appearances.

Basker played for two opponents, first being loaned with great effect (66 runs and two catches) to Judd Street Tigers, who fell only 20 short of a commanding Gents' score of 250-9. This splendid game saw Small's maiden century (106 in 39.4 overs) and No.8 Pentakota's superb 72 off 39 balls, his first club fifty and perhaps the Gents' innings of the year. Connoisseurs of the spinner's art revelled in Small's 18 wickets.

The Gents lost eight times, four times to opponents (batting second each time, three times by margins of six or fewer runs) and four times to the weather. Eleven games were won and the cricket was generally of a high standard against improved opposition. Fixtures were not arranged on three Sundays and only 16 games were played, the lowest since 1992. The game on 2 August saw two tons in a game for the first time. Cloete took only 41 balls to reach his century against London Saints, the club's fastest ever. Saints had been gracious, popular opponents but this was the end of the fixture.

Until called away for his nuptials Hibbert led wisely, while those who stood in followed his self-denying ethos of trying to give everyone a game. They also serve who only stand and wait. Although their seasons were unspectacular, Caveney, Denton, H. Patel, Jones, newcomer Mishra, Newcombe and Thoms all had their moments with bat, ball or gloves. Khan and Toft played only once but gave excellent support behind the scenes and attended the matches when they could. The Gents mourned Alex Young, who died tragically in April aged 32.

The Gents improved in the second half of a mixed season. They failed to defend, thanks to two stupendous individual innings, totals of 260-7 and 203-2, were skittled for 78 and 101 yet produced some confident performances against strong teams. Small scored heavily to head the batting. After May comprised four defeats, results improved in June before July was pretty well washed out. A run of seven wins in August and September ensured a winning season. Cricket was played on 18 weekends, three more than in 2014, when five fewer games were played. One match was curtailed by rain and two cancelled. The call over the winter had been for stronger teams to be introduced. There were no complaints about cheap victories in 2015.

Some notable batting records were set. Left-handers John Elmes of Northfields (165* a record 186 added for the second wicket with Murray) and Fawad Ahmed of Close PF (164*) beat Steve Jones's 158 against West XI in 2002, the previous individual highest innings in a Gents match. A year later, Elmes of Northfields would knock him off his pedestal. The unbeaten stand of 212 between Small (131*) and Kumar (74*) for the sixth wicket against St Anne's Allstars, from a flimsy inherited position of 56-5, remains the highest in club history and the only one north of 200.

The Gents were again dependent on Vijay Basker and his talented friends to supplement the stalwarts and, in the opening match, to provide opposition. The Gents missed the ability and focussed commitment of Pentakota, who had moved to Southampton but would return in 2017. Clark (newly a father), Lall (playing league cricket), Mishra (returned to the United States) and Thoms (work) left the club. S. Desai returned while Denton and H. Patel doubled their 2014 appearances. All-rounder of the year Jampala, Kota (who would take his crown one year on), Krishna, Oruganti, Pingili and Sudireddy added youthful energy and talent, as did Syed-Aguirre, who joined mid-season, introduced by his Cheltenham friends Jones and Newcombe. What a rich seam that was. The perennial question of involvement of stalwarts and newcomers was well handled by the captains. The support of Ken Toft, who regularly travelled from Milton Keynes, was greatly appreciated.

An enjoyable season, mostly warm and dry, was one of great change. Five opponents tumbled off the card, eight new opponents were added (no season has seen a greater number) and 44 men played, 18 just once. Basker, Denton, Desai, Hibbert, Katragadda, Oruganti and Syed-Aguirre played less, while Jones (travelling), Cloete and D. Patel were absent. But tellingly Kumar, Bocha, Kota, who only missed one game, Newcombe and H. Patel (who scored his maiden fifty) played more. In 2015 Bocha scored 103 runs and did not take a wicket. A year later he carded 300 runs and 15 wickets. Yet the season had started with the Gents on the receiving end of a blitzkrieg from Shanin Khan of Bengal Tigers, who hit nine fours and 10 sixes on his way to 146.

Scorecards rarely tell the tale of fielding, in which, as opponents remarked, the Gents excelled despite the lack of a regular wicket-keeper. There were 99 fielding dismissals (79 caught, eight stumped and 12 run out), level with 2009 when two more games were played. Catches by Charatla, Small and Pingili against Wimbledon United, Clapham In and Salix verged on the supernatural. Jampala, fielder of the year again, put in some great shifts.

S. Patel passed 6,000 runs and overtook Snelling's career haul of wickets, only for Snelling to nearly grab it back again at Hale. Gaurav and Tippell of Ashford set an opponents' eighth-wicket record stand of 65 while the hat-tricks by Kota against Judd Street Tigers and Hettiarachchi of Battersea Eagles were the first since 2008. Kumar captained very well and in Small and Bocha had solid deputies. Kumar's contribution was 334 runs (a personal best), 14 wickets and five catches, his form clearly unaffected by responsibility.

Kota had a splendid season, dominating the returns with 480 runs (four fifties), 30 wickets and 9 catches, such startling statistics not having been recorded since the heyday of M. Ashton who scored 490 and took 38 wickets in 1993. He was capable of defence or attack as the situation demanded and was voted Batsman, Bowler and All-rounder of the season.

The November AGM should have been an evening of celebration. Instead it degenerated into chaos when it came to electing a captain, the process followed not adhering in all aspects to best practice. Battle lines were drawn and it was clear the challenge in 2017 was going to be as much off the pitch as on.

Despite the absence of many 2016 regulars and off-field problems lingering from a chaotic and ill-managed AGM, the Gents had a winning thirtieth season. They had more success batting first, failing to defend only twice in 12 but successfully chasing only twice in seven. It was a challenging year but new and old melded well. Kota had returned to India wreathed with garlands, Small was unavailable after May and Desai from April to September, Hibbert played only three matches, Newcombe was crocked in his only game, Kumar damaged his ligaments in July and missed the rest of the campaign, while Denton, Jampala, Oruganti and Sudireddy did not play at all.

New faces but experienced players A. Ahmed, Bandla, Francis, Namilikonda and Sampath (and, briefly, A. Khan and Pervez) were brought in. Pentakota made a most welcome return after two seasons. Full sides were therefore fielded each week, albeit with considerable guest support. Forty-five played, 20 just once. The whistling up of spare players before and even during matches became a niche art form at which Basker and Krishna excelled. It also tested the captains, who had to try to involve everyone. It was a damp summer and home matches with Battersea Eagles and Judd Street Tigers were rained off. Hale and Gubbays bailed for the second year running, which was unfortunate because the club incurred pitch costs but no income.

Bocha's best season yielded 349 runs, 13 wickets, nine catches and three run outs but elsewhere performances were less memorable. Basker's three fifties saw him to 300 runs, three others scored 200, including S. Patel's best aggregate since 2013, and six 100. Seven made a fifty, five fewer than in 2016. Leading bowler H. Patel's 20 wickets and 219 runs propelled him to his first all-rounder's double. Three others took ten wickets.

Bandla, a welcome addition with rarely seen slow left-arm spin, and seamers Chatharaju, Dubey (twice the overs of 2016 with some grudging new-ball spells), Krishna, Kumar, Pentakota and S. Patel were rarely collared and paid around four runs an over, Kumar at 3.31 being the meanest. Chatharaju and Krishna prospered with enhanced responsibility. Ahmed and Namilikonda kept wicket well but catches still fell by 22 in two fewer games. Andrew Cripps of Wimbledon United took 6-1, the best return by an opponent.
